

BULKHEAD MAINTENANCE

Over the years, many of the bulkheads in Colington have fallen into neglect. For some owners, this has not been a priority; either they are not noticing, or they just do not have the funds to maintain it. It is expensive, but it is important to understand that if the bulkhead is not repaired, it could lead to more property loss, more



damage to neighboring properties, and damage during storms.

Other problems a failing bulkhead present is when improving or selling a property. Per our Restrictive Covenants, when a building permit for new construction is applied for, it will not be approved until the bulkhead is replaced. When selling a property, this becomes a disclosure item for prospective buyers, possibly impacting sales. Most importantly, your failing bulkhead and the erosion of property that is already resulting from it, may cause shoaling in the canal in front of your property. If, or when that happens, the Association will have no choice but to protect the navigability of the canal. If they are required to dredge the canal in order for it to remain passable, those fees and any others associated with it can be assessed against the owner. And, other legal action could be taken to collect for the work done on your behalf. Let's do our best to keep these bulkheads maintained, keep this community beautiful, and our neighbors happy.



IRISH LAMB STEW

Prep 20 min., Cook 2 hours 25 min. Ready In 2 hours 45 min.

Hearty and traditional Irish lamb stew. It's best to refrigerate the stew overnight, and reheat it the next day for eating. This soup 'ages' well!

Ingredients

- 1 1/2 pounds thickly sliced bacon, diced
- 6 pounds boneless lamb shoulder, cut into 2 inch pieces
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1/2 cup water
- 4 cups beef stock
- 2 teaspoons white sugar
- 4 cups diced carrots
- 2 large onions, cut into bite-size pieces
- 3 potatoes
- 1 teaspoon dried thyme
- 2 bay leaves
- 1 cup white wine

Directions 1. Place bacon in a large, deep skillet. Cook over medium high heat until evenly brown. Drain, crumble, and set aside.

2. Put lamb, salt, pepper, and flour in large mixing bowl. Toss to coat meat



evenly. Brown meat in frying pan with bacon fat.

3. Place meat into stock pot (leave 1/4 cup of fat in frying pan). Add the garlic and yellow onion and sauté til onion begins to become golden. Deglaze frying pan with 1/2 cup water and add the garlic-onion mixture to the stock pot with bacon pieces, beef stock, and sugar. Cover and simmer for 1 1/2 hours.

4. Add carrots, onions, potatoes, thyme, bay leaves, and wine to pot. Reduce heat, and simmer covered for 20 minutes until vegetables are tender.

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EVEN EXPERIENCED BOATERS NEED A VESSEL SAFETY CHECK (FREE)!



The most cautious boaters can sometimes experience unexpected problems on the water. That's why the U.S. Coast Guard recommends that all recreational boaters, including personal watercraft and paddle sport users, take advantage of the free Vessel Safety Check program every year.

The courtesy Vessel Safety Check (VSC) is performed at your boat – whether in a slip, at the launch ramp, or in your driveway – by a certified Vessel Examiner. It usually takes 15 to 30 mins, depending upon the size of your boat.

What's In it For Me?

Boats that pass the examination are awarded a distinctive VSC Decal that alerts the Coast Guard, Wildlife, and other law-enforcement agencies that your boat was found to be in full compliance with all Federal and State boating laws. Frequently, such agencies will not detain or board boats displaying a current-year decal that are otherwise operating safely.

What If I Don't Pass?

If your boat does not pass, no report is filed. Instead, you are provided a written report that aids you in correcting any discrepancies noted. Often, a quick trip to West Marine or Walmart is all that is necessary to obtain missing safety items and easily pass a re-inspection.

USCG Auxiliary certified Vessel Examiners are ready to assist you in making sure your boat has all the safety equipment required by law plus other recommended items.

We will be in Colington Harbour on June 4 from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

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2016 YOUTH SAILING PROGRAM

An Opportunity for the Youth of the Community to Learn to Sail in July

The Colington Yacht Club (CYC) will again sponsor a Youth Sailing Program this summer. This is a US Sail instructional program for young people, ages 8 to 15. Children turning 8 during the camp time must wait until next year. Youth will receive guidance from certified instructors supported by many adult volunteers. They will sail in our Optimist, Sunfish, and Topaz boats and have an opportunity to participate in a regatta.



The Optimist sailboat is designed for children and youth. If the sailor has experience and is able, with training, to right a capsized Sunfish or Topaz sailboat, they may practice their sailing skills with our larger vessels if they desire. Sailors will receive dock-side instruction and hands-on sailing experience, progressing to solo sailing when they are ready.

The total program cost is \$75 per child. We offer this entire program for such a low cost as a service to the families of Colington Harbour. An application/ consent form and a medical form are required to be submitted by parents. These forms are available on the website, colingtonyachtclub.com under the "Youth Sailing" tab. Please submit the registration as soon as possible; the program has filled up within a few weeks of the application being available. Registration opens on March 1st. Registration is complete when your check is received.

The **YOUTH SAILING CAMP** will be held at the Harbour boat ramp Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday mornings from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. starting July 5, 2016. The course ends on Thursday, July 28, 2016. There will be a regatta on Sunday, July 31. Sailors need to bring their own life jacket and wear suitable clothing for sailing. Instruction will be given about appropriate protection.

OSPREYS By Cristina Garey

Any day now, we will be seeing the magnificent OSPREY (Pandion haliaetus) — also called fish eagle, sea hawk, river hawk, and fish hawk. Here on Colington Island, ospreys are common sights soaring over our shorelines and patrolling our waterways on the hunt for food. The shallow Albemarle Sound is an ideal habitat for these birds of prey.

A fish-eating bird with a world wide range, it is a large raptor, reaching more than 60 cm (24 in) in length and 180 cm (71 in) across the wings. It is brown on the upper parts and mostly grey or white on the head and under parts.

Ospreys are excellent anglers, catching fish in 1 of every 4 dives. The average time spent hunting before making a catch is twelve minutes. When spotting fish under water, ospreys often hover briefly before diving, feet first, to grab a fish. Ospreys are unusual among hawks, in possessing a reversible outer toe that allows them to grasp with two toes in front and two behind. Barbed pads on the soles of the birds' feet help them grip slippery fish. When flying with prey, an Osprey lines up its catch head first for less wind resistance. On rare occasions, osprey will eat birds, or small rodents. Here in Colington, we can often clearly see an Osprey's catch in its talons as it flies back to its nest.

Unable to dive to more than about three feet below the water's surface, ospreys prefer shallow fishing grounds, frequenting deep water only where fish school near the surface. Their habitat includes rivers, lakes, reservoirs, lagoons, swamps, and marshes.

Ospreys require nest sites in open surroundings for easy approach and a long enough ice-free season to allow the young to fledge. The nests are elevated, to protect from predatory mammals like raccoons. Treetops being a common natural choice, they tolerate a wide variety of locations, as long as they are near a body of water providing an adequate supply of fish. The osprey readily builds its nest on manmade structures, such as telephone poles, channel markers, duck blinds, and nest platforms designed especially for it. Such platforms have become an important tool in reestablishing the endangered ospreys. These large, rangy hawks do well around humans.

Ospreys usually mate for life. In Spring, the pair partners for five months to build a nest and raise their young. Osprey nests are built of sticks and lined with bark, sod, grasses, vines, algae, or flotsam and jetsam. The male usually fetches most of the nesting material—



and the female arranges it, (imagine that!). Mates return to the same nest year after year. After generations of adding on, they can end up with nests 10-13 feet deep and 3-6 feet in diameter!

Ospreys are a CONSERVATION SUCCESS STORY; their numbers crashed between the 1950's and the 1970's when pesticides poisoned the birds and thinned their eggshells. Along the N.E. coast for example, about 90 percent of breeding pairs disappeared. Osprey studies provided key support for legal arguments against the use of persistent pesticides. After the 1972 U.S. DDT ban, populations rebounded, in part aided by the healthy colonies in the coastal Carolinas. But ospreys are still listed as endangered in some states.

An osprey may log more than 160,000 migration miles during its 15-to-20-year lifetime. The oldest known osprey was 25 years, 2 months old. The name "osprey" made its first appearance around 1460, via the Medieval Latin phrase for "bird of prey" (avis prede).

SPRING CLEANING

Spring cleaning time is here! I think we all look forward to spring cleaning, because it signifies a fresh start for us after the winter months. Spring cleaning can take on another meaning. It's the ideal time to check our homes and yards for dangerous materials and unsafe conditions, and to spend the time to protect our families and our properties.

Start by taking a few minutes to plan your safety clean–up day. You will want to check each room in your house, including the attic and basement. Also, don't forget the garage, yard and storage shed. Plan to do several different things:

1. Remove All Hazards.

Check and correct things like:

- Frayed or damaged appliance cords, wiring, fuses or breakers.
- Remove piles of rubbish, trash and yard debris.
- Remove stacks of paper and magazines; take them to recycling centers.
- Check for water leaks, especially near electrical appliances.
- Check for good clearance between heating appliances and combustibles.

2. Properly Store Flammable Liquids and Home Chemicals.

- Make sure that gasoline and cleaning fluids are well marked and are out of the reach of children and pets. Store in a cool, dry place outside the house.
- Clean up work areas. Put dangerous tools, adhesives, matches or other work items away and out of any child's reach.
- Inventory all home and yard chemicals, paints and poisons. Store them according to their label. Properly dispose of any that are expired, leaking, or look bad, but don't throw them in the trash or down the drain
- Make sure that all chemicals are kept under lock and key and out of reach of children and pets.

3. Check Fire Protection and Safety Equipment. This is important!

• Check your smoke alarm. DO IT NOW, while you are thinking about it. If you need one and can't afford to buy one, call us. We'll help you. If you need help checking or replacing a



battery, call us. But most importantly, make sure your smoke alarm works. If you didn't change the battery in your smoke alarm when you change the time on March 19th, DO IT NOW!

- Check fire extinguishers for proper type and placement.
- Make sure all doors and windows open easily for fast escapes.
- Can we find you in an emergency? Make sure your street numbers are posted properly and are visible. The fire department sells and installs reflective address signs that are great for quickly locating homes.
- Check and make sure you have a working flashlight and battery-powered radio for the approaching storm season.

4. Plan Your Escape Now

- Sit down with your family and make sure that everyone knows what to do in the event of a fire.
- Make sure you have two ways out of every room and that you have a meeting place outside the house for the whole family.
- Practice the plan. Even the best plan is no good if you don't practice it!
- You can do a lot to protect yourself, your family and your property. In fact, you are the key to your safety. A little time spent on simple common sense

Open Burning

Right along with spring-cleaning comes open burning. North Carolina laws are very strict in regard to open burning. In fact, the only items allowed to be

burned are natural vegetation, limbs, twigs and yard debris that originate on the property. Absolutely no trash or building materials of any type may be burned, not even in burn barrels. A permit is required for all open burning, with the exception of small camp fires or outdoor fireplaces. The permits, available from the fire department at no charge, are issued for a maximum of 4 days and only allow burning between the hours of 8 A.M. and 6 P.M. The department may inspect the area before a permit is issued. Try to choose days that the smoke doesn't bother a neighbor. The department may deny permits if conditions are not favorable for safe burning. Call the station for more information 441-6234.

One Last Word...

The Colington Volunteer Fire Department has openings for volunteer firefighters. It's a physically demanding job. Are YOU up to the challenge? Call or stop by the station for more information. And remember, the department hosts Bingo every Wednesday evening. Doors open at 5 P.M. and play begins at 6:30 P.M.

Come enjoy an evening with your neighbors and support the department at the same time!

TIPS FOR KEEPING OUR HARBOUR'S WATER CLEAN

Keeping water clean begins with each of us where we live, work and play, and with the simple daily actions we take. Here are a few ways you can make a difference to reduce pollution:

Plant trees, shrubs and groundcovers, especially around surface water. Vegetation acts as a

natural filter for runoff entering ponds, lakes or streams. Plants can also prevent shoreline erosion and keep soil from washing away.

Maintain a healthy lawn. A dense, healthy lawn can be an excellent filter for pollutants. Before you apply fertilizers, test your soil so you apply only what you need. Use the right fertilizer, at the right time and in the proper amount.


Clean up after pets. Dispose of pet waste in the garbage.

Compost grass clippings, leaves and garden waste. When these materials are washed into streams and lakes, they decay, which in turn consumes oxygen that fish and other aquatic animals need to survive.

Practice integrated pest management (IPM) around your home and garden. IPM reduces pest problems through a variety of cultural, mechanical, biological and chemical methods. Try to eliminate chemical use or keep pesticide use to a minimum by using them only when other methods are not successful.

Maintain your vehicles in good condition to prevent leaks such as oil or antifreeze. Spilled motor oil, gasoline and lubricants can contaminate wells and streams. *Thank you for keeping our Harbour clean*!

DIY SILK TIE DYED EASTER EGGS TUTORIAL

- First you'll need to start with 100% silk ties (brighter colors turn out the best)
- Go ahead and open up the ties by removing the stitching up the middle. Most likely you'll find that there is a white liner inside the tie. Set this aside to use later.
- Wrap your egg in the silk fabric and tie it up at one end with string or floss
- This is where you can get creative. You can use one large piece of fabric or sourceal small string. For



- or several small strips. For small hands, it may be easier if the fabric is wet when it is wrapped around the egg.
- So you don't get large white spaces on your finished Easter eggs, wrap the egg many times over with the string.
- After you've wrapped the egg in silk, you'll need to wrap it in clean white cotton. (old pillowcase, white t-shirt, lining from the tie)
- Boil the eggs for 20 minutes in 2 cups of water and a 1/4 cup of white vinegar.
- Remove them from boiling water and let them sit in the cold water for 10 minutes.

Unwrap and enjoy!
