

CHA Board Meeting Schedule

Meetings are held the 3rd Tuesday of every other month. Next one is Tuesday, November 19th at 7:00 pm at the Clubhouse.

IN THE KNOW:

The Colington Harbour Association is run by elected board members and their support staff, including the office personnel, guard gate, and maintenance. The administrative office is located inside the clubhouse at the end of Colington Road, by the marina. The clubhouse is owned by the CHA, and our hours are posted on <u>our website</u>. We can assist with vehicle bar codes, new owner welcome packets, obtaining permits for home and lot modifications, HOA collections, boat trailer stickers, park pavilion rentals, and we are here to answer questions from residents about living in the community.

The clubhouse can also be used for events such as weddings and other special occasions, and is managed separately by the Colington Harbour Yacht & Racquet Club, along with the pool and tennis courts. Payments for membership to the pool and club rentals are handled through CHY&RC, and you can find them online at http://www.chyrc.org.

The <u>Colington Yacht Club</u>, a great organization for boaters, offers the annual Youth Sailing Camp, various races and regattas, Wednesday Night Social Sails, along with other social and service events.

♯ "OAKLEY" – our Southern Live Oak

For many, our beloved oak has been a part of many memories, including weddings, family



reunions, and beautiful pictures. Visitors, young and old, have loved to climb on it. We have had questions and concerns regarding "Oakley" – yes, we named our beauty!

We had an arborist (Chase Patterson) from Albemarle Landscaping assess our tree, and are happy to report that Oakley has received a clean bill of health!! The tree is EXTREMELY healthy and thriving. Oakley is estimated to be over 200 years old, and with anything old – needs to be nurtured. While Chase was here, we also discussed the sand around the tree. He does not suggest us building up the sand around Oakley periodically to ensure she continues to thrive. We have

placed a plaque and a beautiful fence around Oakley to protect her. We frown upon anyone climbing on the tree or its roots. 200 years old!!!! – she is one old tree!! Please admire her from a distance.

Once hurricane cleanup began, our maintenance team started work on cleaning up the sound front beach, which suffered some minor damage - with a large tree and big limbs down, as well as an exposed septic line. The Marketplace is a FREE service where Colington Harbour members can advertise items for sale, list items wanted, services offered, or services needed on the CHA website:



Unlike many other sites, the ads are monitored for spelling errors, inappropriate content, etc., prior to being published on the site. If the ad is not acceptable, the CHA Marketplace Manager will notify the individual placing the ad to allow for corrections.

Following are some of the rules and regulations to use the service:

- Person placing ad must be a member, in good standing, of the Colington Harbour Association.
- ♣ Ads are limited to 2-3 lines of text, along with one or two photos. (Photos will be cropped by the CHA Marketplace Manager, if needed.) In addition, the ad can also contain a 'URL' that would point to a picture of the item on the Internet.
- Ads must include at least one of the following: a contact phone number, text number, or email.
- No addresses will be permitted within the ad.
- Ads will remain on the site for a minimum of 3 weeks, unless removal is requested by the person placing the ad.
- No ads for any commercial entities/businesses will be permitted.



A FEW FRIENDLY REMINDERS

Living in a private community like Colington Harbour comes with many benefits. In order to protect, preserve, and enhance property values in the community, and ensure an enjoyable experience for residents, the Colington Harbour Association has a set of <u>protective covenants</u> to which all residents must adhere.

The CHA office receives numerous calls and visits from residents, with questions and concerns about these covenants for a variety of reasons. Questions range from inquiries about building permits, to neighbors potentially violating a covenant. Our Covenant Enforcement Officer, Pat McGowan, spends a great deal of time investigating complaints, answering questions, and discussing covenant violations in order to keep our community safe and beautiful.

Below are a few of the common ordinances that have been addressed recently:

As you may have noticed, we have had a deputy monitoring the front gate on some weekends. During these times, he has stopped several visitors and residents for failing to stop



at the gate, running the red light, or not yielding to the traffic in the right-hand barcode lane. A list of violators has been turned over to Covenant Enforcement for appropriate action.

We encourage all homeowners and residents to inform your visitors to obtain a pass at the guard gate. Visitors must adhere to our community covenants while visiting. Non-residents who continue to run the gate, may be stopped by law enforcement, and charged with trespassing. Residents will be referred to the Board of Directors, to explain why a fine should not be imposed.

♯ TRASH CANS

renters of these rules.

We have been receiving many complaints from our residents about trash cans being left on the curb. Our trash is picked up on Mondays and Thursdays. Our covenants require trash cans to be moved back as soon as possible, after trash pick-up. We are having renters placing their cans out on Saturday before checking out. The cans then sit until Monday morning trash pick-up by Dare County. If you are renting a home, it is imperative that you abide by our covenants, and inform your

ORDINANCE 8 – RENTAL PROPERTY

Section One - Notification

Owners shall inform the Association of the name of their agent or tenant, the duration of the lease, and shall post a copy of these Community Ordinances in a prominent location within the rental property.

Section Two - Obligation of the Owner

Owners are responsible for notifying their tenants, whether directly, or through their agent, that they must comply with these Ordinances and other applicable regulations. When notified of a violation, property owners are also responsible for taking immediate corrective action, which includes removal of the tenants from the property, if necessary.

ORDINANCE 5 – HOUSEKEEPING

Section 5 – Garbage and Trash

- a) Garbage and trash shall be placed in containers as stated in county ordinances. Plastic bags and other debris outside the container are not allowed.
- b) Property owners are encouraged to place containers at street-side on collection days only; on other days, store containers in the least visible area around or under your house.

♣ RESIDENT VEHICLE BARCODES

We have had many violations at the front gate, and would like to encourage our homeowners to adhere to our community covenants while visiting. All homeowners and residents must have a working barcode (free of charge) on their vehicle. Please take notice as you are coming through the gate in the barcode lane. Do you get a red light? If so, please call or visit the office. Your sticker is either an expired temporary tag, an expired lease, or it is just not working. Continuous red-light violations are monitored, and could result in further action by the Board.

INLET COMMITTEE REPORT:

Colington Harbour will have its own dredge soon.

Colington Harbour is a canal community with a beautiful harbor, and an inlet that gives us access to the Albemarle Sound, Atlantic Intercoastal Waterway, Atlantic Ocean, etc.

Boating, kayaking, fishing, crabbing, and other watersports all depend upon an open navigable inlet. These activities support our property values, whether we personally take part in them or not. The Colington Harbour Association has worked, and paid for years, to keep the inlet open by hiring outside dredgers to relieve shoaling. Shoaling, in this case, is an underwater sandbank, which results in making parts of the inlet more shallow. Mother Nature causes shoaling in various areas throughout the inlet, almost annually.

CAMA, the agency formed by the Coastal Area Management Act, North Carolina 1974, oversees the amount of spoils (sand taken) allowed, and the disturbance of the sea bed. This is the agency to which the CHA must apply for the proper permits to dredge the inlet.


CAMA enforces restrictions that limit dredging to only certain weeks of the year. These restrictions protect not only the spawning of aquatic life (our fish and shellfish), but also other life forms that depend upon that food source. Dredging must begin no earlier than mid-October and cease no later than mid-February.

Using outside contractors for this service has often left CHA at their mercy; as far as the cost and the timing. There are only a small number of companies that can perform this service, and costs have continued to rise. A great part of the cost has been for the mobilization fees (cost of transporting equipment to our site). In 2018, the contractor's barge sank on the way to another job, and at the end of our window of opportunity on the calendar. Another choice of vendor bid for the job, but the bid was considered exorbitant. As a result, the inlet was not dredged, and it continues to shoal out by the markers.



To improve our results and contain costs going forward, the CHA has committed to the purchase of our own dredge. The dredge is a DINO 6, and is a one-man operation (pictured here). It is trailer mounted

and can be launched at the ramp. The unit is 22 feet long, and weighs 3,800 pounds. It will cut a path 6 feet wide per pass, and





The dredge is scheduled to arrive in early October. This will allow us to better manage both our costs and the results. The dredge should pay for itself within $2\frac{1}{2}$ - 3 years.

A WORD FROM THE COLINGTON FIRE DEPARTMENT

PLAN AHEAD TO ESCAPE HOME FIRE:

Before we share fire safety information for this edition of Harbour Headlines, we wanted to comment on Hurricane Dorian.

Our department takes a proactive position regarding preparation and life safety. We only share weather information and forecasts from official sources, such as the National

Hurricane Service and Dare County Emergency Management. Flooding as much as 6 or 7 feet above ground was forecasted. Fortunately, the storm headed East pretty quickly and spared us from flooding for the most part. However, the winds were stronger during this storm than most can remember, bringing many trees and powerlines down. During the height of the storm, we were forced to suspend operations for the safety of our crews.

As soon as we could safely respond, our crews handled over 45 incidents in a very short period of time. Our main take away from this storm is that if you aren't a first responder, stay off the roads while we are working to clear them.

We sent a crew to Ocracoke to help with storm cleanup for some of the residents. They said they never imagined the destruction until seeing it first-hand. Please keep our neighbors on Hatteras and Ocracoke Islands in your thoughts as they face a lengthy recovery.

Have a safe and happy upcoming holiday season!

No time of year is as exciting and enjoyable as the coming holiday season! Throughout the Halloween, Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons, family and friends, young and old, will gather to share the warmth that only this time of year brings. Unfortunately, these seasons are also characterized by a tremendous amount of fires—many of which are traced back to seasonal decorations. The Colington Volunteer Fire Department believes that following a few simple, common sense suggestions can prevent most fires:

- Watch Children...who are often the victims of fires. Be especially careful with matches and lighters. Teach children to stay away from candles, fireplaces and heaters.
- Remind Trick-or Treaters...By using a flashlight, they can see and be seen by others. Only go to homes with a porch light on. Wear clothing with reflective markings or tape.
- Choose Toys with Care...Don't let a toy become a tragedy! Steer clear of any toy that produces heat or sparks. Make sure costumes and bed clothing are flame retardant and never buy any electrical toy that has not been thoroughly tested by a safety laboratory.
- Check Your Lights...They may be pretty, but are they safe? Check your cord sets for damage. Make sure all lights are UL tested and that they are used properly. Never use any lights on a metal tree.
- Don't overload circuits, and use only outdoor-approved sets outside. Be sure to turn lights off before you leave home or go to bed.
- Be Careful with Decorations...Keep all decorations away from any flame or heating device. Choose only fire-retardant type decorations. Be especially careful with dried grass or corn stalks!
- Use Candles with Caution...Take the time to trim wicks before lighting candles. This can reduce the amount of soot they produce. Never burn candles for an extended period, and never leave them unattended. Candles cause numerous fires annually, especially this time of year.
- Check Your Tree...Fresh cut trees and other forms of "cut" decorations need plenty of water. Keep them fresh. Never place near warm or hot air and never use candles near them! Once they start to shed or dry out, get rid of them.
- Also, don't forget about space heaters. Give them plenty of space—at least 3 feet! Don't let children or wrapping paper get too close. Consider installing a cage around the heater to guard against accidents. And finally, install and test smoke alarms and plan what to do should a fire occur. To start, a quick check of your smoke alarm should ensure that you will have enough warning of impending danger. Also, plan and practice your family's fire escape plan.

Heroes wanted. Your fire department is always looking for a few good men and women to become volunteer fire fighters. Training drills are held on Tuesday evenings. Experience is not necessary, but physical ability and a willingness to serve your neighbor is.
